Course Description:

Special Topics Course:

This course provides students with a critical understanding of international development issues in the Caribbean through an examination of contemporary debates and arguments being advanced for reparations for Caribbean slavery and Native genocide. Central to this understanding the course examines the broad and interconnected issues of enslavement, colonialism, contemporary neoliberal economic policies and Caribbean underdevelopment. The course equips students to develop a sophisticated appreciation for the Caribbean lifeworld not as a deficit of some vital developmental factor, but as a feature of its unique history. Through the examination of reparatory justice models, successful reparations claims (i.e. American reparations to the Japanese; Post-Holocaust German reparations to Israel and British reparations to Kenya) students will critically analyse and assess the claim that Caribbean reparations is both a needed source of development finance and a matter of global social justice and human rights. Attention will be given to understanding the dimensions of: Caribbean Dependency theory; comparative approaches to reparations and; discourses for and against reparations as a core component of economic and social justice strategies in the Caribbean. Theoretical, practical and ethical issues of relationships between the global south and global north are explored to illuminate the assertion that historic and present-day economic arrangements continue to negatively impact Caribbean development. This course directs discourse away from simplistic binary debates of being for or against reparations and instead elevates the debate to a search for reparations theories that provide a sustained critique of oppressive world systems, thereby aligning Caribbean reparations theory with emerging radical and critical scholarship on Caribbean development.

Special Topics Course:

This course will explore the dialectic relationship between migration and development. While historical debates and theories with regards to this relationship will be touched upon, the focus will mainly be on contemporary global migratory movements under the current development context. More specifically, we will look at the processes of migration through the lens of structure and agency, analyzing the constructed and constructing role of various migration and development agencies, including nation states, recruitment companies and global enterprises. Course: IDST 4830/IDST 6641.1 Special Topic: Borders, Migration, and Development, the Africa-EU Nexus

Department: International Development Studies Program, Faculty of Arts, Saint Mary's University.

Schedule: Lectures: Wednesdays, 4-6:30

Academic Calendar Description:

This course explores the relationships between migrations, borders – as sites of spatial and temporal control of transnational flows of goods, capital and people – and development in the context of Africa and Europe.

Moving beyond the discussions on diasporas and the effects of economic and social remittances on poverty reduction the course will examine the theoretical constructs purporting to explain migration from individual decision and family strategy models to more complex critical and Marxist perspectives on migration as an integral part of colonial histories and of uneven capitalist development. More recent approaches to migration studies including those factoring in institutions, migrant networks, globalization processes, migration policies and governance, gender differences, environmental degradation and political and ethnic strife and violence will also be discussed.

Cross border flows, within and out of Africa and its sub regions, will be examined in their historical and quantitative dimensions. There will be a discussion of various categories of flows (seasonal, circular, labour, irregular, forced, trafficking) and the effects on these flows of borders as spatial exclusionary/inclusionary mechanisms and as temporal controls leaving some migrants in uncertainty and precarity for long periods of time.

The changing volumes of African migrations with the emergence of migration corridors between African countries and from Africa to the Global North, shape a mobility pattern in which half of African nations' emigrants move and live within the region and the other half live outside Africa with the large majority in Europe. This pattern, explained by historical ties, geographic proximity and migration chains, is being increasingly challenged by European Union leaders and bureaucrats.

The externalization policy adopted by the EU consists in "rebordering" the Union i.e. pushing the border to Africa and the Middle East with massive outlays of migration – tied development aid to origin and corridor states aiming to contain mobility through local development, better border enforcement and

return acceptance. The course will encourage debate on this and other migration management policies from the Global North and the collective and individual responses of African states.

Moving beyond the discussions on diasporas and the effects of economic and social remittances on poverty reduction the course will examine the theoretical constructs purporting to explain migration from individual decision and family strategy models to more complex critical and Marxist perspectives on migration as an integral part of colonial histories and of uneven capitalist development. More recent approaches to migration studies including those factoring in institutions, migrant networks, globalization processes, migration policies and governance, gender differences, environmental degradation and political and ethnic strife and violence will also be discussed. Cross border flows, within and out of Africa and its sub regions, will be examined in their historical and quantitative dimensions. There will be a discussion of various categories of flows (seasonal, circular, labour, irregular, forced, trafficking) and the effects on these flows of borders as spatial exclusionary/inclusionary mechanisms and as temporal controls leaving some migrants in uncertainty and precarity for long periods of time.

The changing volumes of African migrations with the emergence of migration corridors between African countries and from Africa to the Global North, shape a mobility pattern in which half of African nations' emigrants move and live within the region and the other half live outside Africa with the large majority in Europe. This pattern, explained by historical ties, geographic proximity and migration chains, is being increasingly challenged by European Union leaders and bureaucrats. The externalization policy adopted by the EU consists in "rebordering" the Union i.e. pushing the border to Africa and the Middle East with massive outlays of migration – tied development aid to origin and corridor states aiming to contain mobility through local development, better border enforcement and return acceptance. The course will encourage debate on this and other migration management policies from the Global North and the collective and individual responses of African states.

This course explores the relationships between migrations, borders – as sites of spatial and temporal control of transnational flows of goods, capital and people – and development in the context of Africa and Europe.

Moving beyond the discussions on diasporas and the effects of economic and social remittances on poverty reduction the course will examine the theoretical constructs purporting to explain migration from individual decision and family strategy models to more complex critical and Marxist perspectives on migration as an integral part of colonial histories and of uneven capitalist development. More recent approaches to migration studies including those factoring in institutions, migrant networks, globalization processes, migration policies and governance, gender differences, environmental degradation and political and ethnic strife and violence will also be discussed. Cross border flows, within and out of Africa and its sub regions, will be examined in their historical and quantitative dimensions. There will be a discussion of various categories of flows (seasonal, circular, labour, irregular, forced, trafficking) and the effects on these flows of borders as spatial exclusionary/inclusionary mechanisms and as temporal controls leaving some migrants in uncertainty and precarity for long periods of time.

The changing volumes of African migrations with the emergence of migration corridors between African countries and from Africa to the Global North, shape a mobility pattern in which half of African nations' emigrants move and live within the region and the other half live outside Africa with the large majority in Europe. This pattern, explained by historical ties, geographic proximity and migration chains, is being increasingly challenged by European Union leaders and bureaucrats. The externalization policy adopted by the EU consists in "rebordering" the Union i.e. pushing the border to Africa and the Middle East with massive outlays of migration – tied development aid to origin and corridor states aiming to contain mobility through local development, better border enforcement and return acceptance. The course will encourage debate on this and other migration management policies from the Global North and the collective and individual responses of African states.
